"Teachers who apply to be fellows go through a rigorous screening process, and only 18% of the people who apply are selected."

He says this award gives him the opportunity to grow as a teacher through a nationwide network will benefit his students.

The award is given to stem teachers, which helps develop skills in the science, technology , engineering, and math fields.
